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Mission

Essential Competency Requirements of the Nursing Student

All students accepted into the Nursing Program are expected to have the following six competencies in order to effectively and safely perform the responsibilities of a nursing student.

- A. Motor Skills: Candidates should have sufficient motor function so that they are able to execute movements required to provide general care and treatment to patients in all health care settings.
- B. Sensory/Observation: A candidate must be able to acquire the information presented through demonstrations and experiences in the basic and nursing sciences. He or she must be able to observe a patient accurately, at a distance and close at hand, and observe and appreciate non-verbal communications when performing nursing assessment and intervention or administering medications. The candidate must be capable of perceiving the signs of disease and infection as manifested through physical examination. Such information is derived from visual images of the body surfaces, palpable changes in various organs and tissues, and auditory information (patient voice, heart tones, bowel and lung sounds).
- C. Communication: The candidate must communicate effectively and sensitively with other students, faculty, staff, patients, family, and other professionals. He or she must express his or her ideas and feelings clearly and demonstrate a willingness and ability to give and receive feedback. The candidate must be able to communicate effectively in oral and written forms.
- D. Cognitive: A candidate must be able to measure, calculate, reason, analyze, integrate and synthesize in the context of undergraduate nursing study. The candidate must be able to quickly read and comprehend extensive written material. He or she must also be able to evaluate and apply information and engage in critical thinking in the virtual classroom and clinical setting.

- E. Behavioral/Emotional: A candidate must possess the emotional health required for the full utilization of his or her intellectual abilities, the exercise of good judgment, and the prompt completion of all assignments. In addition, s/he must be able to maintain mature, sensitive, and effective relationships with patients, students, faculty, staff and other professionals under all circumstances including highly stressful situations. The candidate must know that his or her values, attitudes, beliefs, emotions, and experiences affect his or her perceptions and relationships with others. The candidate must be able and willing to examine and change his or her behavior when it interferes with productive individual or group relationships. The candidate must possess skills and experience necessary for effective and harmonious relationships in diverse academic and working environments.
- F. Professional Conduct: Candidates must possess the ability to reason morally and practice nursing in an ethical manner. Candidates must be willing to learn and abide by professional standards of practice according to the Nurse Practice Act. S/he must possess attributes that include compassion, empathy, altruism, integrity, honesty, responsibility and tolerance. Candidates must be able to engage in patient care delivery in all settings and be able to deliver care to all patient populations including but not limited to children, adolescents, adults, developmentally disabled persons, medically compromised patients, and vulnerable adults.

Admissions

General Education Course Requirements

Texas A&M University-Central Texas is an upper-level university; therefore, the core curriculum/general education courses **and nursing Field of Study prerequisites** must be taken at another institution. Core curricula may also be accepted from other institutions. Students may enter the nursing program with up to six (6) semester credit hours of courses remaining.

Admission to the University

All students must be admitted to the University according to applicable policies at the time of application found in [Undergraduate Catalog Admissions Requirements](#).

Admission to the Nursing Program

Requirement for admission to the Nursing Program include:

1. Admission to A&M Central Texas University as outlined above.
2. **Be a graduate of an accredited nursing program leading to an Associate Degree in Nursing, or be in good standing in the last semester of an approved program.**
3. Have an unencumbered Texas Registered Nursing license, or of a Compact State, or be in the last semester or an Associates of Nursing Degree program. **Proof of enrollment in final semester of program will be required.**
4. Have completed the Texas Common Core curriculum and Field of Study for Nursing as outlined in the degree plan. As an exception, may have up to six (6) hours remaining.

How to Apply for Program Admission

1. Meet with Academic Advisor in the College of Arts and Sciences to determine eligibility.
2. Submit Application to the Nursing Program (Appendix A) to Department Chair.
3. Submit a reference form (Appendix B) along with Application to the Nursing Program. The reference form validates safe and recent practice experience as a registered nurse within the last three years prior to acceptance. Or, submit a form from a nursing faculty member if graduation was in the past year and you have not practiced as a registered nurse.

4. Submit official transcript(s) for review in applying to the program. Provide official copies of transcript(s) from each previously attended college or university. See [the Official College Transcripts](#) page for additional details.

Upon admission to the Program, schedule an appointment to meet with a Nursing Department Advisor to establish a Degree Plan (SEP) for graduation and complete admissions paperwork.

Notification of admission to the Nursing Program will be made upon receipt of all required information and verification of current licensure in Texas or Compact State. Pre-NCLEX students who are admitted will only be permitted to take to take N3300 and N3317 until demonstrating successful NCLEX performance.

Degree Requirements

All students are required to meet the [General Education Core Requirements](#) of the University. Refer to the Undergraduate Catalog for specific General Education Core Requirements. The Nursing Department has specific requirements designs to meet the Texas Common Core as well as Field of Study for Nursing required by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. . Course Descriptions

NURS 3300 Professional Transition and Informatics- Nursing is defined, especially as it relates to promotion and restoration of health. Roles of the nurse are explored. Professional nursing is examined from historical and contemporary perspectives, including the philosophy and theoretical foundations that define professional nursing practice. Students will examine personal, professional and cultural values as influences upon nursing practice. The process of critical thinking and the use of nursing informatics is examined from multiple perspectives. Prerequisite: Admission to the Nursing Program

NURS 3304 Nursing Research in Evidence Based Practice- This introductory nursing research course focuses on improving nursing practice based on evidence discovered in the research process. Methods of data collection and analysis, and the interpretation and use of study findings will be evaluated. The importance of scientific integrity and maintaining ethical standards are highlighted. Pre/Co-requisite (s): NURS 3300, MATH 1342

NURS 3307 Health Assessment- This Health Assessment Course introduces the concepts and techniques of health and cultural assessment of individuals and families across the life span, for use with the nursing process. Emphasis is on history/data collection and critical analysis in situations of health and deviations from health. Practicum experiences enable student's practice of clinical assessment skills, analysis, and decision-making for nursing practice. Prerequisite(s): NURS 3300

NURS 3317 Pathophysiology- The focus of this course is to understand the pathophysiological basis for disease processes in adults and children. Central concepts will address symptoms, treatment, and prognosis. The major direction of this course will be on clinical application of findings that underlie pathogenesis and provide a basis for evidence based practice. The course is specifically designed to meet the needs of nursing students. Pre/Co-requisite: NURS 3300

NURS 3330 Care of the Older Adult- Focus is on risk reduction, disease prevention, and strategies for health promotion, restoration, and maintenance in a vulnerable older population. Emphasis is placed on integrating assessment, data analysis, therapeutic communication, and critical thinking skills to direct culturally sensitive care of older adults. Prerequisite(s): NURS 3307

NURS 4405 Care of Individuals and Families- In this course students are expected to synthesize knowledge from previous courses as care is provided to people with complex, unpredictable, or chronic health needs. The student will be self-directed in development of learning objectives and in using the nursing process for knowledge-based nursing interventions, evaluation of outcomes, and revisions in nursing care to maintain, restore, and promote health of individuals and families or to achieve a peaceful death. Individual clients may be children or adults whose care occurs within the context of a family. Emphasis is placed on application of research findings for critical thinking in case management, integration of pathophysiology, psychosocial and cultural concepts and professional values to coordinate care in a variety of settings, with quality and continuity. Pharmacology, pain management, crisis intervention and discharge planning are included. Prerequisite(s): NURS 3300, SOCI 1301 or equivalent

NURS 4506 Community Health Nursing In this course students are introduced to community-based nursing practice and the role of various systems available to individuals, families, and high-risk groups. Issues of health promotion, primary disease prevention and management of chronic health problems in community settings will be explored. The focus is on the use of research findings to assess community settings, assessment of the environment of care, and on the needs of vulnerable populations in community settings. Prerequisite(s): NURS 3300

NURS 4410 Leadership and Management for the RN- The focus of this course is on the concepts of leadership and management, and their implications for delivery of professional nursing care. Assessment and analysis of a real work problem, assessment of the work environment, and development of a proposed solution, as well as principles of client education are included. Prerequisite(s): NURS 3300, lower level speech course

NURS 4212 Professional Practice Issues for the RN- An online course that explores political, legal, ethical, and policy issues affecting the quality of health care delivery and of nursing practice. The responsibility and means by which professional nurses can affect quality are included. Prerequisite(s): NURS 3300, GOVT 2305/24306 or equivalent

Many employees and students encounter a variety of personal, social, and academic issues that may call for assistance beyond advice provided by friends and family. The Counseling Center provides confidential counseling and education to all A&M-Central Texas employees and currently enrolled students at no additional cost, in order to facilitate the retention, adjustment, and development of members of the university community. Counseling can assist in achieving personal and educational goals and provide an opportunity to have a professional counselor listen empathically, help clarify ideas and concerns toward resolving new or long-standing problem situations, as well as provide useful learning and self-management skills, and improve relationships. STUDENTS' ROLE AND PARTICIPATION IN INSTITUTIONAL DECISION MAKING

Students provide input into the decision-making process through the Student Government Association. Student representatives may serve on standing university committees. Various advisory groups and committees, many of which include students, are formed to address specific issues. In addition, the university encourages students not serving on formal bodies to express their ideas and suggestions so that they may be considered in the making of policy decisions. Contact the Department of Student Affairs to join the Student Government Association. Student representatives will be appointed or elected to serve on university committees.

Nursing student representatives are nominated by faculty and elected by the student body each fall for a one-year term to represent the nursing students. They attend a portion of faculty meetings and are given an opportunity to offer suggestions. They are also involved with pinning ceremonies.

Requirements for serving as a nursing student representative align with the university student government requirements:

- Actively registered student
- Undergraduates must maintain at least a cumulative 2.0; graduate students must maintain a cumulative 3.0
- Good standing with institution (though includes GPA, also includes conduct/behavioral)
- Represent the university in a professional and ethical manner
- Serve on one SGA or university committee
- Active participation and attendance

Student Responsibilities and Policies

When providing care to clients, students are held to professional standards for registered nurses. This includes but is not limited to adherence to the Texas Nurse Practice Act (NPA), university and agency policies, and the American Nurses Association Code of Ethics.

General

- Students are responsible for adhering to all the requirements in both the Texas A&M University-Central Texas Student Handbook and in the Texas A&M University-Central Texas Nursing Student Handbook.

- Students must remain in good standing with the Board of Nursing sufficient to maintain licensure as a Registered Nurse in Texas or a Compact state for the duration of their time in the program.
- Students are responsible for reading the syllabi and guidelines for each nursing course and seeking clarification from the course instructor. Students are responsible for following course guidelines.
- Students are expected to be prompt for any synchronous online meetings and are responsible for all material presented and assigned.
- Assignments will be posted on the date due unless prior arrangements are made with the appropriate instructor. If a paper is submitted late, points will be deducted from the grade of the paper. If a paper is deemed incomplete by the instructor, the paper may be returned to the student to correct; late points will be deducted as indicated.
- It is the student's responsibility to discuss questions concerning grades on written assignments or examinations with the appropriate instructor.
- Each student is responsible for information posted on Canvas. Communication from course instructors, and other students may be posted at any time and should be checked daily.

CLINICAL/PRACTICUM REQUIREMENTS

Background Checks

Because health care providers are entrusted with the health, safety and welfare of patients, have access to controlled substances and confidential information, and operate in settings that require the exercise of good judgment and ethical behavior, criminal background checks are required.

The Texas Board of Nursing (BON) has initiated a process for nursing school applicants to complete background check requirements for licensure. Verification of licensure by the school is conducted as a condition of admission. For pre-licensure students, license must be obtained prior to progression as outlined above. An additional background check conducted by university may be required for certain clinical agencies. Students will be notified in writing at the start of the semester in which a background check is required. Background check results will be kept in the student's confidential department file, not with academic records. The cost of background checks is the responsibility of the student.

Professional Liability Insurance

All nursing majors in clinical settings must be covered by Professional Liability insurance. Professional liability limits should include occurrence-based professional liability insurance, in amounts of at least \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 aggregate. Students are responsible for purchase and providing proof of professional liability insurance by the end of the first semester of attendance, and maintaining coverage throughout practicum experiences.

Vaccine Policy

Affiliated clinical agencies may require proof of immunizations prior to completing educational activities within their organization. Students are expected to comply with and provide proof of immunizations to the department of nursing upon request. Students will be notified in writing of clinical agency requirements.

Dress Code for Community Agencies

There may be times when you interact with members of the community in order to complete class projects. During these times, business casual professional dress is required. Examples include:

Blouses/shirts without messages (no T-shirts or tank tops)

dresses or long pants/slacks (no shorts, short skirts)

closed toed shoes (no flip flops)

You could wear your work scrubs but remove the work place badge/ID card (for your privacy and to avoid representing your individual work place)

Grading and Evaluations

Grading

A four-point (4.0) grading system is utilized in Nursing. The grading scale is as follows:

- A: Excellent, Four grade points per credit hour 90 - 100
- B: Good, Three grade points per credit hour 80 - 89
- C: Fair, Two grade points per credit hour 70 - 79
- D*: Poor, One grade point per credit hour 60 - 69
- F*: Failure, No grade points Below 60
- I: Incomplete, No grade points
- NR: Not Reported
- W: Withdrawn

* Minimum academic requirements for retention in the program are a grade of "C" in all nursing courses. A grade of "D" is considered a failing grade in the Nursing Program. Refer to the progressions section for further information.

An "I" must be completed before the end of the subsequent semester in which the "I" was given. The grade of "I" will automatically become an "F" if not removed within the prescribed time limit; however, an extension may be requested by the instructor when the request for an Incomplete Grade form is submitted with the submission of grades, provided that a definitive time frame for completion is presented. An extension will be granted only for circumstances beyond the control of the student.

A grade of incomplete will be marked on the grade roster at the end of the term. It is the responsibility of the instructor to initiate and complete a Change of Grade form. The instructor will complete a Request for an Incomplete Grade form that is filed with the Registrar's Office, which includes a statement of the instructor's reason for giving an incomplete and a statement concerning the remaining work to be completed in a specified time frame. A copy of the form will be sent to the student.

Use of Standardized Testing

The Department of Nursing utilizes computerized exams throughout the program as a component of course grades and for program evaluation. Remote proctoring through the learning management system allows students to take exams off campus. Students are expected to comply with the requirements and standards of the remote proctoring service

regarding exam security. Violations of security as reported by remote proctoring services will be investigated by course faculty and submitted to student conduct if warranted.

Progression Policy

Students may progress in the program when the following conditions are met:

1. A minimum grade of C in all required nursing courses.
2. Students must complete a minimum of 30 hours from A&M-Central Texas.
3. Maintenance of an unencumbered license to practice as a Registered Nurse in the state of Texas (or Compact State) through the duration of time in the program.
4. Students must request permission to repeat a nursing course due to failure or withdrawal.
 - A. A letter of petition must be written to the Nursing Department Chair and must include:
 - i. The reason for withdrawal or failure to successfully complete the course.
 - ii. Steps which the student will take to ensure successful completion of the course when repeated.
 - iii. Date corrective steps will be completed.
 - B. The department chair will take into consideration:
 - i. The student's overall academic performance, GPA on required courses, and review the transcript for a pattern of withdrawals, and the number of repeated courses.
 - ii. The student's plans for corrective action and reasons for failure. The feasibility of the plan is also assessed.
 - iii. The student file, to determine adherence to the program standards and performance in the present or previous courses.
 - C. If permission is granted to repeat a course, it will be on a space available basis.
 - D. Students who earn below a grade of C on any two courses in the nursing program will not be eligible for progression.
5. Students must complete the Nursing Program within five (5) calendar years.

Readmission Policy

Students who have an interruption, as defined as, an inability to achieve a passing grade, withdrawal, or non-enrollment, must gain permission before taking any nursing course.

1. If the absence was due to a health problem, a physician's clearance must be submitted in order to return to classes.
2. Students must have the appropriate prerequisite courses to progress and meet with an advisor prior to registering to develop a degree plan to determine if all curricular and program requirements are met.
3. If the student has been out two long semesters or more, the student must also:
 - a. Submit a completed nursing program application
 - b. Adhere to the most current catalog requirements.
 - c. Fulfill any requirements specified by the Nursing Program Director.

Absence Policy

Class attendance, whether online or face to face, is an important factor for academic success and each student should accept the responsibility for regular attendance. Texas A&M University-Central Texas recognizes each student as an adult with adult attitudes and responsibilities and further recognizes the unique relationship between faculty and students and the responsibility each has toward the other.

The following guidelines have been structured for implementation of Texas A&M University-Central Texas's student absence policy:

Student absences are considered by the university to be a matter strictly between the individual student and faculty member. The faculty member has the responsibility and authority to determine if

make-up work can be done due to absences. Students may request make-up consideration for valid and verifiable reasons such as illness, death in the immediate family, legal proceedings or participation in sponsored university activities. It is the responsibility of students who participate in university-sponsored activities to obtain a written explanation for their absence from the faculty/staff member responsible for the activity.

EVALUATION OF FACULTY, COURSES, AND PROGRAM

- Student participation in faculty, course, and program evaluations is both the student's right and responsibility. The process of evaluation is viewed as the student's opportunity for input into curriculum development and the assessment of faculty effectiveness and student learning needs. Students are therefore encouraged to participate in all evaluations which will be completed at the end of each semester.
- The evaluations are anonymous.
- Students are asked to complete a RN-BSN HESI examination at completion of the program. This is used to measure effectiveness of the program. It is not utilized for student grades, and there is no cost to students. These exams are proctored and may be taken at several testing centers in the area.

Disciplinary Guidelines

Any of the following disciplinary actions may be utilized with students in an effort to correct academic deficiencies and/or unprofessional conduct. Professional conduct is marked by honesty and ethical behavior, accountability, confidentiality, professional conduct and courtesy, safety, responsibility within the academic institution and clinical agency, and competency and growth. The disciplinary actions which are invoked will depend on the severity of the infraction (an act of omission or commission) and potential result of the student's actions(s). The disciplinary action taken will also depend on whether there is a pattern of behavior demonstrated.

Students in the nursing program are subject to the student code of conduct and to disciplinary action as described in the undergraduate student handbook. In addition, students who engage in conduct which is unprofessional or violates the student code of conduct may be dismissed from the nursing program.

The nurse practice act also has statements referring to professional conduct (**§213.27. Good Professional Character.**) and affirmative duty to report unprofessional conduct. All sources will be used in evaluating instances of student misconduct Information from the nurse practice includes:

§213.27. Good Professional Character.

(a) Good professional character is the integrated pattern of personal, academic and occupational behaviors which, in the judgment of the Board, indicates that an individual is able to consistently conform his or her conduct to the requirements of the Nursing Practice Act, the Board's rules and regulations, and generally accepted standards of nursing practice including, but not limited to, behaviors indicating honesty, accountability, trustworthiness, reliability, and integrity.

(b) Factors to be used in evaluating good professional character in eligibility and disciplinary matters are:
(1) Good professional character is determined through the evaluation of behaviors demonstrated by an individual in his or her personal, academic and occupational history. An individual's education, and experience necessarily affect the nature and extent of behavioral history and, therefore, shall be considered in each evaluation.

(2) A person who seeks to obtain or retain a license to practice professional or vocational nursing shall provide evidence of good professional character which, in the judgment of the Board, is sufficient to insure that the individual can consistently act in the best interest of patients/clients and the public in any practice setting. Such evidence shall establish that the person:

(A) is able to distinguish right from wrong;

(B) is able to think and act rationally;

(C) is able to keep promises and honor obligations;

(D) is accountable for his or her own behavior;

(E) is able to practice nursing in an autonomous role with patients/clients, their families, significant others, and members of the public who are or who may become physically, emotionally, or financially vulnerable;

(F) is able to recognize and honor the interpersonal boundaries appropriate to any therapeutic relationship or health care setting; and

(G) is able to promptly and fully self-disclose facts, circumstances, events, errors, and omissions when such disclosure could enhance the health status of patients/clients or the public or could protect patients/clients or the public from unnecessary risk of harm.

Written Warning

- A faculty member will meet with the student to discuss an area of concern. The concern and corrective action, if needed, is documented and signed on a Faculty/Student Interaction Form (Appendix C).
- The original of the interaction form is kept in the student's file. A copy will be given to the student and the faculty member. The Nursing Program Director and course leader will be notified of the written warning.

Contract

- When a corrective action is indicated, a written contract will be formulated.
- The contract will include a description of the concern and a plan of action to correct the problem(s) and/or requirements to be met, as well as the expected time period/limit for the plan of action.
- The contract will also state the consequences for failure to meet the stipulations and/or further violation of professional standards, which may include course failure and inability to progress in the program.
- Follow-up will take place at the end of the period specified on the contract. The faculty member and student will meet to evaluate the disciplinary action. The results will be stated in writing on the interaction form.

Referral to Student Academic and Student Affairs

Disciplinary Action is addressed in the [A&M-Central Texas Student Handbook](#) and is to be followed by students in the Nursing Program.

Disposition of Student Conduct Referrals allows for administrative Disposition or a Formal Hearing as outlined in the [Conduct Process](#). An appeal procedure is available for students. The formal appeal procedure is outlined in the A&M-Central Texas Student Handbook. In order to appeal, a formal written request must be made to the Director of Student Affairs and the Associate Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs within 48 hours after the disciplinary decision has been rendered.

Grievance Procedures

Prior to filing a formal grievance, students are encouraged to attempt to resolve the concern directly with the individuals involved. Students will find that most situations can be effectively addressed in this manner. In general, students wishing to review the action of an individual or department should direct their questions to the persons responsible for the individual or department. Students are provided opportunities to address complaints and grievances through established university procedures for the following: sexual harassment, employment, admissions to the university, disciplinary action, parking citations, academic matters (including grade disputes), and disability accommodations, etc. Procedures for handling specific concerns should be followed.

- Any student wishing to file a grievance shall notify the Associate Director of Student Conduct of that complaint in writing.
- The written notice should state specifically what the grievance is, giving the name, address and telephone number of the student, specific date(s) and, if possible, of any other persons allegedly involved either as witnesses or participants. The student should also state specifically what remedy the student seeks.
- The written grievance must be signed by the student, hereinafter referred to as the complainant, and filed within 30 university working days of the alleged incident. Determination as to whether complaints filed after this deadline will be considered on a case-by-case basis.
- An investigation, as may be appropriate, shall follow the filing of the grievance. In most instances, the investigation shall be conducted by the Associate Director of Student Conduct. These rules contemplate informal but thorough investigations, affording all involved parties an opportunity to submit evidence relevant to the grievance. The investigation process generally is completed within 30 university working days from the time the written allegation is filed.
- A written determination as to the validity of the grievance and a description of the resolution, if any, shall be issued by the investigator and a copy forwarded to the complainant.
- The investigator shall maintain all files and records relating to the grievances filed for one calendar year.
- The right of a student to a prompt and equitable resolution of the complaint so filed shall not be impaired by the student's pursuit of other remedies, such as filing of a complaint with the responsible federal department or agency.

Principle of Equal Education Policy

In compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, A&M-Central Texas has an abiding institutional commitment to the principle of diversity in all areas. In that spirit, admission to A&M-Central Texas and any of its sponsored programs is open to all qualified individuals without regard to any subgroup classification or stereotype. Graduation and Pinning

Graduation

To receive a Bachelor of Science degree from Texas A&M University-Central Texas, a student must complete the following requirements:

- The student must complete all of the requirements for a degree as set forth in the University catalog at the time of admission to the nursing program.

- Residency Requirement
- Writing Proficiency Requirement
- GPA Requirement
- Core Curriculum Requirements
- The student must complete all the degree requirements within five (5) years from admission to the nursing program.
- The student must complete all courses required for the Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing with a minimum grade of “C”.

Application for degree and commencement participation must be completed by the published deadline. Regalia may be purchased from the university bookstore.

[Pinning/Recognition Ceremony](#)

The pinning ceremony is a traditional part of the rite of passage in the nursing profession.

- The details of the pinning ceremony will be decided by student representatives and a designated faculty member.
- Special recognition and awards may also be delivered at this time.
- The pins are purchased much like a class ring and are made available for the ceremony.
- The ceremony will be held before graduation.
