## COURSE INFORMATION

### Course Overview and Description

In this writing intensive course, students apply critical thinking skills to examine personal and professional growth, the nurse's role in professional practice, and philosophies of professional nursing. Nursing theories, the foundations of professional nursing practice, are examined. The concepts of nursing informatics are explored as they interface with ethics, cultural competency, and health promotion concepts. These explorations are accomplished utilizing communication technologies such as learning management systems, the Internet, library electronic databases, and online seminars. Information technology resources are employed for students to demonstrate skills in electronic communications that are essential to professional nursing practice and that require basic competencies in nursing informatics.

**Prerequisite: Acceptance into the Nursing Program or Approval of the Department Chair.**

**Course Objective:** By the end of this course the associate degree registered nurse will have a grasp of the professional expectations of the baccalaureate prepared registered nurse.

### **The Operation of the Online Course and Being an Online Student**

Online learning requires students to be very self-disciplined. For this course, Monday will be considered the class day. Quizzes for this course are used as “learnings” more than testing knowledge. You will have an unlimited amount of time to complete, but only one attempt. So, plan ahead, complete the readings first, and set aside time to complete the quiz.
