This course is an introduction to the methods of criminological and criminal justice research, with emphasis on research ethics, research design, and methods of data collection and analysis.

ASSIGNMENTS

Reading Assignments

The reading assignments are selected chapters from the required textbook and other sources (which are on Canvas under Modules/Course Readings). It is important to have this textbook when class begins so you can keep up with the assigned readings. I recommend you purchase the book as soon as possible so you are adequately prepared for class. Reading assignments are to be completed by the date listed on the Class Schedule. But I suggest that you reread the chapters/articles after class as well.

In-Class Assignments

In-class activities are designed to help you apply the concepts you learn in the reading and in class. You may work in groups to complete the assignment, but each student must submit their own assignment. You will need to turn in the assignment during class to receive credit. **Late in-class activities will not be accepted.**

If you need to miss a class, you can make-up the in-class activity within one week from the missed class session.¹ If you do not make up the in-class activity within one week, you will receive a zero. **In order to make-up an in-class activity, you must provide me with advanced written notice that you will miss the class.** I will not accept notification provided to me via another student. Students who contact me during class cannot make up the in-class activity.

Those who receive approval to make-up the assignment must come during my office hours or make an appointment to make up the assignment. You may not take a make-up assignment home or complete it outside of the office. Make-up assignments cannot be completed as group assignments. Make-up assignments will not be sent via email. Students are not allowed to complete an in-class activity early.

Advanced notice is not required for medical emergencies; however, you must provide written documentation (on official paper with the date(s)) within one week from the class date. You will also have one week from the class date to complete the in-class activity. If you do not complete the assignment within one week you will receive a zero.

I reserve the right to prohibit students who arrive more than 5 minutes late to class from completing the in-class activity that day or to give them a late penalty.

Annotated Bibliography (120 points)

An annotated bibliography provides a summary of research articles used in a research project/literature review. Each student shall locate and read 7 peer-reviewed, journal articles from the online library databases, related to the research question they have chosen for this course. Once the student has read the articles, they will summarize them, succinctly, in one page each. Thus, the annotated bibliography should not exceed 7 pages (excluding the title page). The student will not receive credit for sources that are not peer-reviewed, journal articles. The annotated bibliography must be written in APA style. The annotated bibliography must be submitted via the submission link on Canvas (Modules/Annotated Bibliography/AB submission). Make sure your last name is included in the file name.

Prior to submitting the Annotated Bibliography, students will submit one annotation (one page for one article) for review (due September 17 at 2p). This will allow me to provide feedback to make sure you're on the right track prior to your

annotated bibliography submission. However, this should not be a draft or incomplete version. Make sure your submission is finalized, as I will not review drafts or incomplete submissions.

Annotated bibliographies will not be accepted in hardcopy, email, or course message. Any submission via any of the proscribed methods will receive the late penalty deduction(s) if the assignment is submitted via the Canvas submission link after the deadline. Late submissions will not be accepted or graded after the assignment grades have been posted.

The annotated bibliography will be graded as follows:

Final Research Proposal (325 points)

The Final Research Proposal will provide students with an opportunity to learn how to design a research study in criminal justice. This semester's broad topic will be correctional drug treatment. Students will develop a research question and hypothesis, conduct a literature search and write a literature review, and develop a research plan. The guidelines for the Research Proposal and associated sub-assignments can be found under Modules/Research Proposal/Assignment #. The deadline for submission is December 12 at 3:15p. When you submit your paper, make sure you include your last name in the file name.

This project will take place throughout the course of the semester, and will be broken down into a series of assignments that build to the final product. **Note:** The assignment submissions *are not* drafts. Only final versions will be graded. If you submit a draft or incomplete version of an assignment, I will not grade it and you will have to resubmit it. Students who submit a draft or incomplete assignment and resubmit their final version late will receive a late penalty if it's submitted before I post assignment grades. Students who submit a draft or incomplete assignment and resubmit their final version after I post assignment grades will receive a 0.

Pay attention to the deadlines for each assignment, as late submissions will receive a point(s) deduction, and late submissions will not be accepted once the assignment grades are posted. Students who would like to revise and resubmit proposal assignments (excluding the annotated bibliography) for regrading may do so at any time during the semester. To do this, type a detailed explanation of the changes you made on your graded rubric (in the sections labeled R&R Comments). Upload your graded rubric with your revision comments and your revised paper through the appropriate submission link. If you would like to revise and resubmit in your final proposal submission, make sure you include the graded rubric(s) with your revision

comments when you upload your final proposal through the submission link. **NOTE:** A resubmission *does not* guarantee a higher or perfect score. Students are allowed one revise and resubmit for each assignment. Resubmissions will not be graded if detailed revision comments are not included.

Late final proposal submissions will not be accepted after December 12 at 3:15p. No exceptions.

GRADING

Grades will be posted to the Grade Center on Canvas within approximately one week. Students will be notified if it will take longer to post the grades.

A NOTE ABOUT SEXUAL VIOLENCE AT A&M-CENTRAL TEXAS

Sexual violence is a serious safety, social justice, and public health issue. The university offers support for anyone struggling with these issues. University faculty are mandated reporters, so if someone discloses that they were sexually assaulted (or a victim of Domestic/Dating Violence or Stalking) while a student at TAMUCT, faculty members are required to inform the Title IX Office. It is incumbent on ALL of us to find ways to actively create environments that tell predators we don't agree with their behaviors and tell survivors we will support them. Your actions matter.
