COURSE INFORMATION

Course Overview and description:

This course introduces students to the concept of adaptation and to one account for how this concept has evolved. The course works to understand adaptation as a process rather than to investigate any specific adaptation or set of adaptations. All aspects of the course, even those that

look at specific adaptations, should maintain this conceptual focus.

Student Learning Outcomes (by the end of this course, students should be able to):

- Locate specific arguments about adaptations in some cultural, historical, and/or rhetorical context.
- Differentiate the various priorities shaping adaptation studies.
- Appraise a range of scholarly texts in adaptation studies
- Develop an analysis of an adaptation responding to the above priorities.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

This course will assign nine short essay assignments, five annotations, two review essays, and three project essays. The specific requirements for each of these assignments and their point values have been posted in the appropriate place in our CANVAS shell.

In general, your final grade will depend on the following point distribution:

Students will need to earn 207 points to earn an A; 184 points to earn a B; 161 points to earn a C; and, 138 points to earn a D. As this a point-based grading system, there are no borderline grades. Students will earn the grade their point total awards them. Students wanting to avoid the frustration of “just missing” a higher grade should take seriously every assignment in the class.

Posting of Grades

Students will be able to track their grades throughout the semester using the gradebook in CANVAS (note: I will have to add the grades for annotations during the semester. I will do this once in early November and again at the end of the class).

Professors cannot drop students; drops are the responsibility of the student.
