## **COURSE INFORMATION**

**Course Overview and description:** Examine database concepts and structures, and understand file and data management principles underlying database construction. Learn fundamental types of database models, with emphasis on relational databases and major non-relational forms. Develop skills in analysis, design, development, and optimization of working database applications on a variety of problems.

### **Course Objective:**

#### **Student Learning Outcomes:**

1. Explain the role of databases and database applications in business.
2. Use data modeling to create relational databases.
3. Describe and distinguish among normalized forms
4. Design entity-relationship diagrams using standard notation
5. Transform data models into database concept designs using referential integrity constraints
6. Create SQL statements for constructing database components and for retrieving information from databases.
7. Describe the special needs of multi-user databases and techniques to control data concurrency issues.
8. Explain the difference between two and three-tier client/server architecture

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

**Reading Assignments:** All assigned chapters will be used as basis for class and/or canvas discussions. Students are expected to study the assigned readings before each class session.

**Attendance/Participation Policy:** Class attendance is required. The policy as officially stated by the University will be enforced. Students are expected to make arrangements with the instructor before missing a series of classes due to job requirements. Students are responsible for any material missed during an absence. In all cases, the responsibility remains with the students to meet/obtain all course requirements/changes. Regular course progress is expected. **Syllabus Quiz:** There will be one syllabus quiz worth 20 points in the first week.

**Examinations:** This course will have two midterm examinations and one final examination. Each midterm is worth 200 points. Final exam is worth 300 points. The exams will be held in classroom. Makeup exams will be given ONLY when arrangements have been made PRIOR to the class meeting.

**Group Project:** Each Student will be assigned to a group required to design a database system. More information about this project will be distributed later. The group project will include a presentation and will be worth 300 points. Project will be considered late if submitted after the due date. A late penalty of 20 points per hour will be applied. That means that NO submissions will be accepted after 15 hours (300 points - 100% deduction!). Late project will NOT be accepted unless extenuating circumstances are present and documented.

**Notes:** If there are multiple parts for your midterm and assignment submission, please submit all parts in a SINGLE zip file. I would suggest you create a folder for each part, and then you can zip that entire folder at once...

The University Library provides many services in support of research across campus and at a distance. We offer over 200 electronic databases containing approximately 250,000 eBooks and 82,000 journals, in addition to the 72,000 items in our print collection, which can be mailed to students who live more than 50 miles from campus. Research guides for each subject taught at A&M-Central Texas are available through our website to help students navigate these resources. On-campus, the library offers technology including cameras, laptops, microphones, webcams, and digital sound recorders.
