COURSE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The study and critical appraisal of various theories of crime causation, including an examination of classical, biological, psychological, and sociological perspectives on the etiology of crime.

The goal of the course will be to help students become familiarized with various theories used in criminological research and the creation of criminal justice policy. Students will learn how to critically analyze the theories covered in the course, as well as various arguments and viewpoints from researchers and fellow classmates.

Course Objectives

1. Students will become familiarized with the exciting world of criminological theory.
2. Students will learn key concepts of criminology.
 - a. The content of major criminological theories.
 - b. Theoretical research within the field of Criminal Justice.
3. Students will apply key concepts to problems in Criminal Justice.
4. Understand the impact of criminality, theories, and research on policies.

COURSE POLICIES

Respect

In this course, we will be discussing subject matter that some may consider controversial. Some students may find the readings and/or comments very challenging. Our purpose in this course is to explore this subject matter deeply and consider multiple perspectives and arguments. Students are encouraged to ask questions and voice their perspective, and are free to disagree with views expressed in the course or in the readings. However, this must be done in a respectful manner.

Netiquette

All students must abide by the following core rules of netiquette (excerpted from Shea, 1994¹) for the duration of the course on discussion boards and email.

Rule 1: Remember the human - Do unto others as you'd have others do unto you. Imagine how you'd feel if you were in the other person's shoes. Stand up for yourself, but try not to hurt people's feelings.

Rule 2: Adhere to the same standards of behavior online - Standards of behavior may be different in some areas of cyberspace, but they are not lower than in real life.

Rule 3: Know where you are in cyberspace - When you enter a domain of cyberspace that's new to you, take a look around. Spend a while listening to the chat or reading the archives. Get a sense of how the people who are already there act. Then go ahead and participate.

Rule 4: Respect other people's time and bandwidth - ...don't expect instant responses to all your questions, and don't assume that all readers will agree with -- or care about -- your passionate arguments.

Rule 5: Make yourself look good online - As in the world at large, most people who communicate online just want to be liked. Networks -- particularly discussion groups -- let you reach out to people you'd otherwise never meet. And none of them can see you. You won't be judged by the color of your skin, eyes, or hair, your weight, your age, or your clothing.

Rule 6: Share expert knowledge - Don't be afraid to share what you know.

Rule 7: Help keep flame wars under control - ...Netiquette does forbid the perpetuation of flame wars -- series of angry letters, most of them from two or three people directed toward each other, that can dominate the tone and destroy the camaraderie of a discussion group. It's unfair to the other members of the group.

Rule 8: Respect other people's privacy

Rule 9: Don't abuse your power - Some people in cyberspace have more power than others...Knowing more than others, or having more power than they do, does not give you the right to take advantage of them.

Rule 10: Be forgiving of other people's mistakes - ... when someone makes a mistake -- whether it's a spelling error or a spelling flame, a stupid question or an unnecessarily long answer -- be kind about it. If it's a minor error, you may not need to say anything. Even if you feel strongly about it, think twice before reacting. Having good manners yourself doesn't give you license to correct everyone else. If you do decide to inform someone of a mistake, point it out politely, and preferably by private email rather than in public. Give people the benefit of the doubt; assume they just don't know any better. And never be arrogant or self-righteous about it. Just as it's a law of nature that spelling flames always contain spelling errors, notes pointing out Netiquette violations are often examples of poor Netiquette.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Reading Assignments

The reading assignments are taken from the required textbook and the PowerPoints posted each week. I recommend you purchase the book as soon as possible so you are adequately prepared for class. I also suggest you purchase and read the Recommended Resources, as they will help you complete your assignments. I strongly urge *against* using resources from the internet unless it is a resource I have suggested/assigned.

Reflection Questions (15 points each)

For each group of theories (i.e. Neo-Classical Theories), there will be a reflection question (RQ). The question will be posted at the beginning of the week for that group of theories (Monday at 12:00a) and due by the end of the week (Sunday at 11:59p). I will pose at least one question, and you must provide a thoughtful answer. Make sure you provide support for your answer using the powerpoint and/or assigned text. *Do not* include examples, hypothetical scenarios, analogies, or anecdotes/personal experience in your answer unless instructed to do so. **Note:** My expectation is that you will provide a fully fleshed out, substantive answer using the correct terminology from the theories. In addition to content, you will be graded on writing mechanics and quality. Reflection questions must be written at a college level. Reflection questions can be found on Canvas under Modules/Week # (i.e. Modules/Week 5).

Reflection questions will be graded as follows:

Reflection Question Components	Points
Content Clearly answers the question Provides sufficient support for answer	10 points
Writing Mechanics and Quality Writing is clear, formal and concise. Very little informal writing or wordiness. College-level writing.	5 points
Late penalty	-5 points

Late reflection questions will be accepted up until a week after the due date or when I post grades (whichever comes first) with a 5-point penalty. Late reflections questions will be accepted without penalty if I receive documented, written notice that you will be unable to complete the assignment due to employment conflicts or military obligations. **This documentation must be provided before the deadline and include dates of the conflict/obligations.** You will have one week from the due date to submit the completed assignment. Submissions later than a week will not be accepted.

Advanced notice is not required for medical emergencies; however, you must provide written documentation (on official paper with the date(s)) within one week from the deadline. You will have one week from the deadline to submit the completed assignment. Submissions later than a week will not be accepted.

Routine Activities Project (50 points)

Submit a PowerPoint with examples of the key components included in the Routine Activity Theory. The examples must be pictures taken by the student (they cannot be pictures from current/previous students or from the internet). The guidelines may be found on Canvas under Modules/Routine Activities Project/RAP Guidelines. The project is due July 29 at 11:59p, and must be submitted as a PowerPoint presentation (ppt or pptx) via Modules/Routine Activities Project/RAP Submission. Submissions will be considered late starting on July 30 at 12:00a, and will receive a 5-point late penalty for each day they are late. Late submissions will not be accepted after the assignment grades are posted.

The Routine Activities Project will be graded as follows:

RAPs will not be accepted in hardcopy, email, or course message. RAPs submitted via any of the proscribed methods will receive the late penalty if they are submitted via the Canvas submission link after the deadline.

Quizzes (50 points/each)

There will be four quizzes worth 50 points each. These quizzes will be multiple choice and true/false. The quiz will be posted at the beginning of the week (Monday at 12a) and must be completed by the end of the week (Sunday at 11:59p). **Late quizzes will not be accepted.** The Learning Objectives posted each week will aid students in studying for the quizzes.

Exceptions can be made if I receive documented, written notice in advance that you will miss the week due to employment conflicts or military obligations. You must include the dates of the conflict/obligations.

Documentation must be received by Friday at 5p of the previous week.² You will have one week from the quiz week to complete the make-up quiz,³ which will be short answer. In the event of a medical emergency, you must provide written documentation (on official paper with the date(s)) within one week from the quiz date. You will also have one week from the quiz due date to complete the make-up quiz, which will be short answer.

The answers to the quizzes will not be displayed after they are graded. Students who would like feedback on their quizzes may see me (or talk via phone) during my office hours or make an appointment to meet with me.

Final Paper (100 points)

Students will analyze a movie or real-life case using one criminological theory. This will not be a group assignment, and **late papers will not be accepted.** The complete guidelines and rubric may be found under Modules/Final Paper/Final

Paper Guidelines. You must have your paper reviewed by the Writing Center or Tutoring Services prior to submission. Documentation that your paper was reviewed by the Writing Center or Tutoring Services must be submitted no later than the due date. Final Papers must be submitted via the submission link on Canvas (Modules/Final Paper/Final Paper Submission) by August 8 at 11:59p. Make sure you include your last name in the file name. **Papers will not be accepted after the deadline (starting August 9 at 12:00a).**

Papers will not be accepted in hardcopy, email, or course message. Papers submitted via any of the proscribed methods will not be accepted if the paper is submitted via the Canvas submission link after the deadline.

Emergency Warning System for Texas A&M University-Central Texas

911Cellular is an emergency notification service that gives Texas A&M University-Central Texas the ability to communicate health and safety emergency information quickly via email, text message, and social media. DROP POLICY

If you discover that you need to drop this class, you must complete a Drop Request Form (https://www.tamuct.edu/registrar/docs/Drop_Request_Form.pdf).

Professors cannot drop students; this is always the responsibility of the student. The Registrar's Office will provide a deadline on the Academic Calendar for which the form must be completed, signed and returned. Once you return the signed form to the Registrar's Office, you must go into Warrior Web and confirm that you are no longer enrolled. UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

The University Library provides many services in support of research across campus and at a distance. We offer over 200 electronic databases containing approximately 250,000 eBooks and 82,000 journals, in addition to the 85,000 items in our print collection, which can be mailed to students who live more than 50 miles from campus. Research guides for each subject taught at A&M-Central Texas are available through our website to help students navigate these resources. On campus, the library offers technology including cameras, laptops, microphones, webcams, and digital sound recorders.

Research assistance from a librarian is also available 24 hours a day through our online chat service, and at the reference desk when the library is open. Research sessions can be scheduled for more comprehensive assistance, and may take place on Skype or in-person at the library. Assistance may cover many topics, including how to find articles in peer-reviewed journals, how to cite resources, and how to piece together research for written assignments.

Our 27,000-square-foot facility on the A&M-Central Texas main campus includes student lounges, private study rooms, group work spaces, computer labs, family areas suitable for all ages, and many other features. Services such as interlibrary loan, TexShare, binding, and laminating are available. The library frequently offers workshops, tours, readings, and other events.
