Course Description: Explore social processes and social problems as they are contained in the highly interdependent world system. Examine social change and development through historical, comparative, and critical perspectives. Analyze the problem of how and why societies and cultures around the world change, and evaluate whether those changes promote justice, equity, democracy, and development of human potential.

Course objectives:

- Students will be able to use a sociological perspective when thinking about social change and economic development.
- Students will be able to articulate various concepts and ideas related to globalization, transnational inequality, development, and social change.
- Students will develop critical thinking skills by looking at ongoing debates in development thought, including those that inform development theory and practice.
- Students will be able to place contemporary patterns of economic development in a historical context.
- By the conclusion of the course, students will be able to identify the causes and consequences of economic changes in society.

Mode of instruction and course access: This course is 100% online and uses the A&M-Central Texas **CANVAS** Learning Management System [<https://tamuct.instructure.com>]. CANVAS is where you will find 100% of the information related to this course, including discussions, quizzes, and exams. Monitor CANVAS for announcements every day, not just on the days things are due/assigned, since due dates occasionally may change.

Course requirements:

Below is a description of the five main activities for this online course. They include (1) reading assignments, (2) mini essays, (3) participation on the course discussion board, (4) taking online quizzes, and (5) one final exam.

You will notice that most of your grade is based on weekly work, which means it is imperative that you keep up with readings and weekly assignments. Students who ignore the weekly assignments and attempt to "catch up" later in the semester have a very difficult time passing the course.

1. **Reading assignments and other materials:** Readings for the course are listed in the schedule below. Students should complete the weekly readings before attempting to complete any assignment, including discussion boards. **Additional readings will be available online in the course E-Reserves folder.** E-Reserve readings are marked on the course schedule as "eRes" readings and are just as important as the readings from your book. ****Our E-Reserve password is: bethechange** (all lower case)

I will also provide you with links to films, news articles, or video clips in the weekly modules. Please be sure to look at all the supplemental items I post, as they are a part of our learning materials for the course. Quizzes and your final exam may include questions on any of the readings, supplemental videos, and news articles.

2. **Mini essays:** Instead of a major term paper, students will compose four mini essays that reflect the weekly topic. These essays will be private (i.e. can only be viewed by the student and instructor) and are your chance to analyze and reflect on the readings for the week. Essays should be approximately 600-900 words and should demonstrate that you have completed the readings and have

engaged in thoughtful consideration of the themes contained within. These essays do not need a title page. They should be single spaced, 12-point font, with a reference list and in-text citations. Students should use ASA or APA style. **Mini essays are due on Sundays at 11:59 PM CST.** Each essay is worth 25 points, for a total of 100 points or 20% of your grade.

3. **Discussion Boards:** Students will participate on our course discussion board, with graded discussion taking place during 5 of the 16 weeks this semester. Participation on graded discussion boards is imperative and will constitute 26% of your grade, or a total of 130 points. Your primary/initial postings will address my weekly discussion question(s) and should be made by **midnight (11:59 PM CST) each Thursday**. Once several initial posts have been made, you will move on by reading and responding to at least two of your peers' primary posts. Response posts commenting and reflecting upon the comments of your peers should be made by **midnight (11:59 PM CST) each Sunday. Late posts will not receive credit.**

****Please see the detailed instructions for discussion boards posted to Canvas.**

4. **Quizzes:** Students will take 6 quizzes at regular intervals throughout the course. Quizzes are each worth 25 points, or 150 points in total (30% of your grade). Quizzes will cover the readings and other material assigned for the same week. On weeks when you have a quiz, you should first complete the readings and take notes. There will be **no discussion board or reflection essay during the weeks you take a quiz** so that you can focus on and prepare for the quiz. Prepare and manage your time wisely; you will not be able to re-take a quiz, nor can you re-open a quiz once you have started it. Quizzes will be **available from Wednesday afternoon until Sunday at 11:59 PM CST. There are no makeup quizzes.** The Sunday night deadline is final.

Note: Questions from the quizzes will help you prepare for the final exam because certain questions will reappear on the final.

5. **Final Exam:** There will be one comprehensive final exam that covers readings, discussion boards, and any other supplemental material we engaged with during the semester. The format will be a combination of multiple choice, matching, and short essay questions. This exam will be available for a handful of days: December 10th, 11th, and 12th. **You will only be able to open and take the final exam one time. If you have technical problems during an exam please email me immediately so I can try to resolve the problem.** The comprehensive final exam is worth 120 points, which is 24% of your grade.

Make-up and late policies

This is a 100% online course. You are responsible for managing your time to make sure you complete all assignments on time. ****There are no make-ups for discussion posts, journals, or quizzes.**** In the event that a student experiences an illness, injury, or other emergency that causes them to miss a discussion board or quiz, the student has the right to an alternative assignment to make up missed points. The instructor will choose the alternative assignment. In this case, the student must provide official documentation that includes their name and the dates of the illness or emergency (e.g. doctor's note, police report).

A student may only make up **the final exam** if there is illness, injury, or another *documented* excuse. If a student misses an exam due to illness, injury, something out of their control they must 1. Provide documentation (doctor's note, police report, etc), 2. Notify Dr. Schoen as soon as possible of intent to take a make-up exam, and 3. Prepare to take the make-up exam within 1 week of the excused absence. Students who miss an exam with no excused absence will receive a zero for that exam. If the student foresees that s/he will be unable to complete the course, then s/he should drop the course or accept the posted grade.

Plagiarism policy

If you are confused, please ask me. If an assignment is found to be plagiarized, the student will receive a zero for that assignment and a referral to Student Affairs. University Library

The University Library provides many services in support of research across campus and at a distance. We offer over 200 electronic databases containing approximately 250,000 eBooks and 82,000 journals, in addition to the 85,000 items in our print collection, which can be mailed to students who live more than 50 miles from campus. Research guides for each subject taught at A&M-Central Texas are available through our website to help students navigate these resources. On campus, the library offers technology including cameras, laptops, microphones, webcams, and digital sound recorders.

Research assistance from a librarian is also available 24 hours a day through our online chat service, and at the reference desk when the library is open. Research sessions can be scheduled for more comprehensive assistance, and may take place on Skype or in-person at the library. Assistance may cover many topics, including how to find articles in peer-reviewed journals, how to cite resources, and how to piece together research for written assignments.

Our 27,000-square-foot facility on the A&M-Central Texas main campus includes student lounges, private study rooms, group work spaces, computer labs, family areas suitable for all ages, and many other features. Services such as interlibrary loan, TexShare, binding, and laminating are available. The library frequently offers workshops, tours, readings, and other events.
