COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

This course is a junior-level elective recommended for any person with an interest in juvenile delinquency and the unique operations of the juvenile justice system. This course begins with an examination of basic facts relating to the nature and extent of delinquency in America. The course then focuses on why juveniles

become delinquent by examining various theories or explanations of delinquency. The course explores the extent to which delinquency is caused by individual traits, peer group, family, school, and other factors. Finally, the course will examine general strategies to control and prevent delinquency through the juvenile justice system - the police, juvenile courts, and juvenile corrections.

Course Objectives

1. Students will demonstrate writing skills appropriate to the discipline of Criminal Justice.
2. Students will demonstrate proficiency in the use of technology appropriate to the discipline of Criminal Justice.
3. Students will understand and value Criminal Justice ethics.
 - a. Students will demonstrate an understanding of ethical issues in juvenile justice operations.
4. Students will understand basic theoretical perspectives of Criminal Justice.
 - a. Demonstrate an understanding of juvenile delinquency in America.
 - b. Demonstrate an understanding of the historical development of juvenile justice system in Europe and America.
 - c. Demonstrate an understanding of the most prominent contemporary theories of the causality of delinquency and the justice policy implication of these theories.
 - d. Demonstrate an understanding of the law enforcement role in the prevention, investigation and prosecution of delinquency.
 - e. Demonstrate an understanding of the role of the juvenile court in the juvenile justice system.
 - f. Demonstrate an understanding of the role of juvenile corrections in the juvenile justice system.
 - g. Demonstrate an understanding of legal issues in juvenile justice operations.

ASSIGNMENTS

Reading Assignments

The reading assignments are selected chapters from the required. It is important to have this textbook when class begins so you can keep up with the assigned readings. I recommend you purchase the book as soon as possible so you are adequately prepared for class. Reading assignments are to be completed by the date listed on the Class Schedule. But I suggest that you reread the chapters/articles after class as well.

In-Class Assignments

In-class activities are designed to help you apply the concepts you learn in the reading and in class. You may work in groups to complete the assignment, but each student must submit their own assignment. You will need to turn in the assignment during class to receive credit. Assignments must be completed with a pencil (regular not colored), or a pen with standard blue or black ink. **Late in-class activities will not be accepted.**

If you need to miss a class, you can make-up the in-class activity within one week from the missed class session.¹ If you do not make up the in-class activity within one week, you will receive a zero. **In order to make-up an in-class activity, you must provide me with advanced written notice that you will miss the class.** I will not accept notification provided to me via another student. Students who contact me during class cannot make up the in-class activity.

Those who receive approval to make-up the assignment must come during my office hours or make an appointment to make up the assignment. You may not take a make-up assignment home or complete it outside of the office. Make-up assignments cannot be completed as group assignments. Make-up assignments will not be sent via email. Students are not allowed to complete an in-class activity early.

Advanced notice is not required for medical emergencies; however, you must provide written documentation (on official paper with the date(s)) within one week from the class date. You will also have one week from the class date to complete the in-class activity. If you do not complete the assignment within one week you will receive a zero.

I reserve the right to prohibit students who arrive more than 5 minutes late to class from completing the in-class activity that day or to give them a late penalty.

Quizzes (100 points)

There will be two quizzes worth 50 points each. The quizzes will be multiple choice and true/false. The Learning Objectives posted each week will aid students in studying for the quizzes. Quizzes must be completed with a pencil (regular not colored), or a pen with standard blue or black ink. Smart watches must be removed and put away prior to starting the quiz.

Quizzes cannot be taken early or made-up. Exceptions can be made if I receive documented, written notice in advance that you will be unable to attend class due to employment conflicts or military obligations. You will have one week from the quiz date to complete the make-up quiz. Final Exam (150 points)

The final exam will be cumulative and short answer. A study guide will be posted on Canvas at least a week in advance to help you prepare. The exam must be completed with a pencil (regular not colored), or a pen with standard blue or black ink. Smart watches must be removed and put away prior to starting the exam.

If you cannot attend class on December 12 due to a work or military obligation, you must provide written, official documentation with the date of conflict by the end of the class session on December 5. You will have until December 13 at 5:00p to *complete* the final exam. If you cannot make up the exam by December 13, then you must take it early.

Write a one- to two- page reaction essay on one city covered in the documentary, *The Prison in Twelve Landscapes*. Your reaction essay must include specific references to the documentary. This submission is worth up to 5 points and must be submitted as Word document (.doc or .docx). You may turn in two essays (each essay covering a different city), for a total of 10 extra credit points. **Essays submitted in a previous/different class will not be accepted. If plagiarism is detected, you will not receive points and I will report you to the Office of Student Conduct.**

DROP POLICY

If you discover that you need to drop this class, you must complete a Drop Request Form

Professors cannot drop students; this is always the responsibility of the student. The Registrar's Office will provide a deadline on the Academic Calendar for which the form must be completed, signed and returned. Once you return the signed form to the Registrar's Office, you must go into Warrior Web and confirm that you are no longer enrolled. UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

The University Library provides many services in support of research across campus and at a distance. We offer over 200 electronic databases containing approximately 250,000 eBooks and 82,000 journals, in addition to the 85,000 items in our print collection, which can be mailed to students who live more than 50 miles from campus. Research guides for each subject taught at A&M-Central Texas are available through our website to help students navigate these resources. On campus, the library offers technology including cameras, laptops, microphones, webcams, and digital sound recorders.

Research assistance from a librarian is also available 24 hours a day through our online chat service, and at the reference desk when the library is open. Research sessions can be scheduled for more comprehensive assistance, and may take place on Skype or in-person at the library. Assistance may cover many topics, including how to find articles in peer-reviewed journals, how to cite resources, and how to piece together research for written assignments.

Our 27,000-square-foot facility on the A&M-Central Texas main campus includes student lounges, private study rooms, group work spaces, computer labs, family areas suitable for all ages, and many other features. Services such as interlibrary loan, TexShare, binding, and laminating are available. The library frequently offers workshops, tours, readings, and other events.
