4. Demonstrate an understanding of consensus and conflict theorists and their theories.
5. Demonstrate an understanding of the two goals of the U.S. criminal justice system.
6. Demonstrate an understanding of the differences between planned change and unplanned change in an organization.

MAJOR COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Exams (50%). Exams assess your level of understanding of all course material, including videos and additional readings. The format may be multiple choice, fill in the blank, true/false, and matching. Students receive limited feedback with their score, for more detailed feedback students must contact the instructor.

Quizzes (50%). Reviews require students match definitions to terms and concepts found in the chapter. The purpose of these quizzes is to ensure reading and understanding of the material. Students receive limited feedback with their score, for more detailed feedback students must contact the instructor.

To Do Assignments – To Do assignments do not require a submission and you do not receive a grade. To Do assignments supplement the course material by providing links to video, audio, or articles that can help students understand the content.

ATTENDANCE, STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES, AND PERFORMANCE POLICY

Attendance. A student is "attending" the course if they are actively interacting with the Canvas course pages and completing assignments. Some content, like the syllabus and other course materials are marked "to-do". This

means students must review the material, but may not require submissions (that is not to say that the information contained within “to-do” assignments will not be required for a subsequent quiz – quite the contrary). Other assignments like quizzes, exams, and written assignments have specific due dates. You will find due dates for all assignments in their respective assignment link.

Student Responsibilities. Students are responsible for keeping up with the reading and utilizing the resources available to learn the material. Modules are organized by week to give students an opportunity to complete the readings and assignments in a timely manner. Each module contains slides for the chapter, chapters summaries, and additional tools for learning. Students are expected to refer to these materials and contact the instructor for further clarification.

Other responsibilities:

- Read the assignment instructions. Failing to follow instructions will affect your scores.
- Read all of the information included with assignment instructions. There are usually helpful tips included.
- Meet with a writing tutor to review your work before submitting it (if an assignment requires a substantial writing sample beyond short answer or essay test questions).
- Submit assignments on time or ahead of time.
- Review the comments I make on your submissions and contact me for more information.
- Have reliable internet access or have a backup plan to work somewhere that does.

Performance Policy. Writing is important and significantly affects scores. In general, college level writing contains no spelling and grammar errors. All information should be paraphrased unless a direct quote is necessary. Overall, writing should be concise, without losing important information, and submission should be strongly organized moving from point to point in a logical and organized manner.

Late Assignments – I generally do not accept late assignments. However, there are exceptions. Whether I accept a late assignment depends on a student’s overall performance in the class.

When assessing overall performance, I focus on:

- Repeated meaningful communication (i.e. to discuss course material and performance) with the instructor. This does not include requests for extensions or excuses for late submissions.
- Demonstrated use of all available course materials.
- Assignments are completed on time.

If the student's performance warrants a special consideration, the late assignment is graded at the end of the semester and will receive limited feedback.

Drop Policy – If you discover that you need to drop this class, you must complete a Drop Request Form, found through the Registrar’s web page <https://www.tamuct.edu/departments/business-office/droppolicy.php>

Professors cannot drop students; this is always the responsibility of the student. The Registrar’s Office will provide a deadline on the University Calendar for which the form must be completed, signed and returned. Once you return the signed form to the Registrar’s Office, you must go into Warrior Web and confirm that you are no longer enrolled. If you still show as enrolled, follow-up with the Registrar’s Office immediately. You are to attend class until the procedure is complete to avoid penalty for absence. Should you miss the drop deadline or fail to follow the procedure, you will receive an F in the course, which may affect your financial aid and/or VA educational benefits.

University Library – The University Library provides many services in support of research across campus and at a distance. We offer over 200 electronic databases containing approximately 250,000 eBooks and 82,000 journals, in addition to the 72,000 items in our print collection, which can be mailed to students who live more than 50 miles from campus.
