COURSE INFORMATION

ENGL 4338. Film Genres - 3 Credit Hours.

This course examines genre as a means of production and reception. Attention is given to the recurring characters, actions, and values in films and the cultural role of these stories. Prerequisite(s): <u>ENGL 1301</u>.

3 Semester Credit Hours.

This course requires students to integrate and use fundamental concepts learned in previous courses within the students' degree concentrations including research and analysis of real-world phenomena and problems. Students will participate actively in online class discussions, present written reports, and analytical and summative essays.

From the authors of our text: "This book is designed to provide an introduction to one of the most fascinating, complex and problematic categories of film. Film Noir has generated an enormous amount of academic work over the past few decades and to the student, it can all look rather daunting: a large and increasingly amorphous field of study."

In this course, students will study the characteristics, visual style, and narrative themes that define film noir along with studying the genre's beginning during the prehistory and wartime of WWII from 1939-45, the postwar period of 1945-50, and the later period of 1950-58. Post WW I, the latter 40 years of the twentieth century and the first 20 years of the twenty-first century will be included. In addition, they will review a case study that is focused on the returning veteran problem and post-WW II film noir.

Students are expected to be familiar with the philosophy, definitions, terms, and procedures of film noir while researching chapters of our text and participating actively in online discussions of the assigned readings and embedded film clip examples. Your final assignment will be to write a summative essay, consisting of a collection of your past reflections, which becomes a discussion of relevant information from chapters and film clip examples you have studied throughout the course, along with comparison scenarios of practices you have chosen to highlight, and situations or genres in which they might apply. As we work our way through the semester, you will be asked to write short reflections, summaries, and analyses of specific selections from the research you have done. At the end of the semester, these reflective analyses will come together, along with other writing elements, to form your formal final research paper. Although this is not a graduate-level course, this is an intensive research-based course, and the rigor is extensive, especially during the last weeks. Do not get behind, or you will not only lose points, but you may find that you have to drop the course.

Student Requirements

- 1. Examine and then question statements related to Film Noir.
- 2. Make intelligent observations about the benefits and shortcomings of the material in weekly readings and embedded film examples through both online discussions and in weekly reflections.
- 3. Collect and evaluate a library of sources concerning film studies issues used in our class text and including a variety of genres.

Course Objectives:

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students will be able to differentiate between the common definitions of film noir currently in use and use these studies to conduct research for written reflections on their chosen topic.
- 2. Students will be able to select and highlight, through online discussions, film study and research methods they choose as most harmful/useful, based on their personal experience, our text, and current research.
- 3. Students will be able to select the study and research devices they feel best fit strategic approaches to film study through essays in the study film noir.
- 4. Students will develop the ability to blend forms of study from a variety of genres to fit situations where one mode alone may not be sufficient to be effective and reflect those studies through written essays.

Competency Goals

- 1. Students will read and respond, both in essay form and through written, online discussion, to a variety of film noir characteristics described in the text and used for the creation of film noir films.
- 2. Students will read and respond, both in essay form and through written, online discussions, to a variety of film noir practices, described in the text and used in a variety of embedded film clip examples.
- 3. Students will discover, and apply, their personal choices of the "correct" practices necessary for identifying specific film noir situations.
- 4. Students will discover their personal philosophies for understanding the form and content characteristic to film noir, through reading, embedded film clips, written reflections, and written discussion responses, and record those in essay format.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Course Requirements: (Use MLA or APA guidelines on all the writing that you turn in. All work must be in Microsoft Word format, and submitted through CANVAS—I will not accept emailed assignments or any other format than MS Word. Also, as a rule, I do not accept late assignments, without prior approval.)

Participating in an online course requires quite a bit of responsibility on the part of the

student (see course calendar). You must log daily in order to check for messages from the professor or other students, read daily postings on discussion forums, respond to prompts from the professor and other students, and remain active for attendance purposes. Those students who reserve their comments for the last day the forum is accessible do not get the full impact of the course and will not receive the full participation grade for the week. Also, simply making a comment in order to satisfy the participation component will not work.

Comments should be substantive, insightful, and should generate further discussion.

Students who do not keep up with assignments and discussion forums should consider dropping the course. If you do not feel that you are ready for an online course, you can gauge your readiness by taking this assessment for online learning at (http://tamuct.smartermeasure.com).

Since this is an online course, students are expected to log on a minimum of five (5) days each week and participate in online discussions by posting a minimum of one original comment, and responding to a minimum of two of their classmates' comments each week. Lack of participation will constitute an absence and reduce your weekly participation grade by a minimum of five points.

Weekly Readings and Written Reflections: You will compose (10) <u>reflections</u> of sections from your readings of the text. Each reflection will address a specific film noir tactic, theory, or practice you choose to investigate from each section in the text, along with any outside information you might find that correlates with that topic. For each reflection, begin with an MLA heading and a concise summary (250-350 words) of a specific topic you single out that you feel is of great importance within the study of Film Noir. Following the summary, address the general strengths and weaknesses of how that topic is used in the example clip for

that chapter. You are not required to address/review the entire chapter, only a specific point, or points, you cite as most important. Please supply short references from the clip, if necessary, to illustrate your application of the practice. Use Mircosoft Word format Only. Each Reflection is worth (10) points.

Discussion Participation: As mentioned above, you are expected to contribute to the course discussion each week. Count on providing at least one substantive original comment each of fourteen (14) weeks about your readings or in response to my prompts. Also included are comments you post as responses to the posts of others. Each week you are required to post responses to at least two of your classmates' comments, referring to them by name. Grades are not assigned to specific posts, but your contributions each week are worth five (5) points for each of the next 14 weeks. In addition to the discussion of readings, also provided is a forum for other course questions and comments. Please check the open discussions often to see what your classmates are asking or commenting on. You might be able to help.

Grades for this section will be collected and posted regularly. Discussion is important to any course, and in an online course even more so, since we have no ability for face-to-face classroom conversation. Each participant's comments and points of view are essential to gaining knowledge about any subject or topic, and I put quite a bit of weight on an active discussion.

Comments should be substantive and should be made early in the week so that active discussion can take place. Students making comments in the final minutes or hours of the discussion window will not get full credit for participation/discussion.

Final Essay: This is a **summative essay** that gives you yet another opportunity to ponder the ideas of how film noir fits within the world of cinema and your future film studies. You will write a summation essay, discussing the practices you have studied throughout the course, comparisons of practices you have chosen to highlight, and characteristic situations and scenarios in which they might apply. This is a very substantive assignment and should reflect your critical insight into interdisciplinary methods that can be applied to fit specific situations such as yours. The average length of these papers has been 5000 words, but feel free to go longer if necessary.
