COURSE INFORMATION

Catalogue Course Description: A supervised field-based experience in classroom teaching, interns must demonstrate proficiency in applying effective teaching practices and classroom management strategies in a school classroom. Prerequisite: admission to a teacher certification program at Texas A&M Central Texas; satisfactory performance in the professional development courses preceding the internship. Completion of the field experience is required in order to pass this course. No Grade lower than a B will be accepted.

Course Objective:

The student will demonstrate effective teaching practices in a field-based setting and reflect on his/her role as a professional educator as he/she moves forward on the continuum from preservice to in-service educator.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. The teacher intern demonstrates knowledge of the state accountability system in selecting content for lesson plans.
- 2. The teacher intern designs instruction appropriate for all students that reflects an understanding of relevant content and is based on continuous and appropriate assessment.
- 3. The teacher intern promotes student learning by providing responsive instruction that makes use of effective communication techniques, instructional strategies that actively engage students in the learning process, and timely, high-quality feedback.
- 4. The teacher intern utilizes technology ethically and legally.
- 5. The teacher intern recognizes the value of reflective practice to facilitate growth as a professional educator.

Competency Goals Statements (certification or standards):

Dimension 2.2 Content Knowledge & Expertise. The clinical teacher uses content and pedagogical expertise to design and execute lessons aligned with state standards, related content and student needs.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Beginning of Year Checklist SLO 1-4

5 points

To ensure a successful beginning to the internship, the intern, with his/her mentor must complete the Beginning of the Year Checklist. Present the checklist to the mentor and enlist his/her support in accomplishing the numerous tasks that a beginning teacher must complete to begin the school year. The checklist is in a .pdf and located in Canvas. Students will submit their checklist to Canvas by the due date.

Weekly Schedule SLO 4

5 points

Students will complete the Weekly Schedule and turn it in to their Field Supervisor. This will assist the Field Supervisor in scheduling his/her visits for observations. At any time, your weekly schedule changes, you must submit a new Weekly Schedule to your Field Supervisor. It is your responsibility to email the Weekly Schedule on time to reflect organization and professionalism. The form is a .pdf and located in Canvas.

Weekly Conference with Mentor Log (Qualtrics) SLO 4 10 points Students are required to keep and maintain their Weekly Conference Log with their mentor. This document is in Qualtrics and requires input and signatures from both the intern and mentor.

Professional Goals and Action Plan

SLO 1-4

10 points

During the first few weeks of school, interns need to meet with their mentor to identify the interns' personal and professional strengths and weaknesses. After discussion, the mentor will assist the intern in the development of professional growth goals and identify actions needed to facilitate attainment of the goals. The goals and actions will be documented on the Fall Action Plan for Professional Growth. A commitment is then made to evaluate progress in relation to each goal at the conclusion of the semester. The Fall Action Plan is a .pdf and located in Canvas. It is due within the first month of school.

Monthly Journal (4) SLO 1-3

10 points

Students will complete monthly journals to reflect upon the classroom's events and garner insights into effective teaching, providing the intern with a history of growth as a teacher. Students must use APA style and submit the journal in Word to Canvas by the due date.

Plan for Learning (4) SLO 1, 3

10 points

With guidance from your mentor teacher, complete this plan for the lesson your field supervisor will observe. The Plan for Learning Standards Based Lesson Plan will be sent via email to your Field Supervisor no later than 8:00 a.m.3 days prior to your observation. This Lesson Plan and the Field Supervisor's emailed responses and reflective coaching questions constitute your PRE-CONFERENCE. Use provided .pdf form in Canvas and submit to Canvas. Email your Plan for Learning to fieldexperiences@tamuct.edu.

Intern Observation of Mentor (2) SLO 1-3

10 points

Students will conduct (4) 30 minute observations of their assigned mentor. (two each semester) Use provided form in Canvas and submit in Canvas and to fieldexperiences@tamuct.edu. Be prepared to share your feedback with your mentor and field supervisor.

Mentor Observation of Intern (2) SLO 1-3

10 points

Mentors will conduct (4) 30 minute observations of their assigned intern. (two each semester) Use provided form in Canvas and submit in Canvas and to fieldexperiences@tamuct.edu. Be prepared to share your feedback with your mentor and field supervisor.

Intern Observation of Other (1) SLO 1-3

10 points

Students will conduct (2) 30 minute observations of someone in another grade band or content area. (one each semester) The purpose of this assignment is to see a variety of teaching and classroom management strategies. Use provided form in Canvas and submit in Canvas. Be prepared to share your feedback with your mentor and field supervisor.

Professional Development Opportunities SLO 4

5 points

There are a variety of professional development opportunities on your campus that will allow you to be more engaged and cognizant of the daily functions of a campus. A list of opportunities will be provided to you; however, some include attending an ARD, 504, ELPS mtg; PTA/PTO, carnival, field trips, grade level meetings, before/after school duties, etc. Use your journal to document and reflect on our experiences in these opportunities. Complete the Professional Development Opportunities .pdf located in Canvas and submit to Canvas by the due date.

PPR Representative Test SLO 1-4

5 points

In preparation for the PPR exam, students will study and take the PPR Representative Test. It is scheduled for October 23 from 9-11. All students MUST attend – this is mandatory.

Seminars (4) SLO 1-4

10 points

Students will attend monthly class Seminars on campus. We will review the POP cycle feedback and discuss various aspects of the classroom including curriculum, lesson planning, instruction, differentiation, assessment and classroom management. All students are required to attend.
