Course Description:

Explore social processes and social problems as they are contained in the highly interdependent world system. Examine social change and development through historical, comparative, and critical perspectives. Analyze the problem of how and why societies and cultures around the world change, and evaluate whether those changes promote justice, equity, democracy, and development of human potential.

Course objectives:

- Students will be able to apply a sociological perspective when thinking about social change and economic development.
- Students will be able to articulate various concepts and ideas related to globalization, transnational inequality, development, and social change.
- Students will develop critical thinking skills by looking at ongoing debates in development thought, including those that inform development theory and practice.
- Students will be able to place contemporary patterns of economic development in a historical context.
- By the conclusion of the course, students will be able to identify the causes and consequences of economic changes in society.

Mode of instruction and course access:

This course is 100% online and uses the A&M-Central Texas **CANVAS** Learning Management System [https://tamuct.instructure.com]. CANVAS is where you will find 100% of the information related to this course, including discussions, quizzes, and exams. Course requirements:

Below is a description of the five main activities for this online course. They include (1) reading assignments, (2) mini essays, (3) participation on the course discussion board, (4) taking online guizzes, and (5) one final exam.

You will notice that most of your grade is based on weekly work, which means it is imperative that you keep up with readings and weekly assignments.

Students who ignore the weekly assignments and attempt to "catch up" later in the semester have a very difficult time passing the course.

 Reading assignments and other materials: Readings for the course are listed in the schedule below. Students should complete the weekly readings <u>before</u> attempting to complete any assignment, including discussion boards.

Readings not in your book will be available online in the course E-Reserves folder. E-Reserve readings are marked on the course schedule as "eRes" readings and are just as important as the readings from your book. **Our E-Reserve password is: development (all lower case).

This is an 8-week course, but we will cover a full semester of materials and content. That means the reading load may be heavier than what you experience in your 16-week classes. It is important that you keep up with readings and manage your time wisely.

2. Mini essays: Instead of a major term paper, students will compose mini essays that reflect a course topic. These essays are your chance to analyze and reflect on the readings for the week. Essays should be approximately 600-900 words and should demonstrate that you have completed the readings and have engaged in thoughtful consideration of the themes contained within. Mini essays are due on Sundays at 11:59 PM CST. Each essay is worth 50 points, for a total of 100 points.

Format: No title page. Name, course, and date at the top. Times New Roman, 1.5 spacing, 12-point font, with a reference list and in-text citations. Students are expected to use ASA or APA style.

- 3. Discussion Boards: Students will participate on our course discussion board, with graded discussion taking place during 6 of the 8 weeks this semester. Participation on graded discussion boards is imperative and will constitute 30% of your grade, or a total of 150 points. Your primary/initial postings will address my weekly discussion question(s) and should be made by midnight (11:59 PM CST) each Thursday. Once several initial posts have been made, you will move on by reading and responding to at least two of your peers' primary posts. Response posts commenting and reflecting upon the comments of your peers should be made by midnight (11:59 PM CST) each Sunday. Late posts will not receive credit. Please see the detailed instructions for discussion boards posted to Canvas.
- 4. Quizzes: Students will take 5 quizzes at regular intervals throughout the course. Quizzes are each worth 30 points, or 150 points in total. Quizzes will cover the readings and other material assigned for the same week. On weeks when you have a quiz, you should first complete the readings and take notes. Prepare and manage your time wisely; you will not be able to re-take a quiz, nor can you re-open a quiz once you have started it. Quizzes will be available from Wednesday afternoon until Sunday at 11:59 PM CST.

Note: Questions from the quizzes will help you prepare for the final exam because certain questions will reappear on the final.

5. **Final Exam:** There will be one comprehensive final exam that covers readings, discussion boards, and any other supplemental material we engaged with during the semester. The format will be a combination of multiple choice, matching, and short essay questions. **You will only be able to open and take the final exam one time.** If you have technical problems during the exam please email me immediately so I can try to resolve the problem. The comprehensive final exam is worth 100 points, which is 20% of your grade.

Posting of Grades:

- All student grades will be posted using the CANVAS grade book and students should monitor their grade status through this tool.
- Students should always refer to the syllabus for total points and points possible. The Canvas gradebook tool may misinform students from time to time.
- Grades will be posted within 7-10 days of due dates. Some assignments could require more time to read through and give individualized feedback. For such assessments, you may need to be patient.

Make-up and late policies

This is a 100% online course. You are responsible for managing your time to make sure you complete all assignments on time. **There are no make-ups for discussion posts or quizzes.** In the event that a student experiences an illness, injury, or other emergency that causes them to miss a discussion board or quiz, the student has the right to an <u>alternative assignment</u> to make up missed points. The instructor will choose the alternative assignment. In this case, the <u>student must provide official documentation</u> that includes their name and the dates of the illness or emergency (e.g. doctor's note, police report).

A student may only make up **the final exam** if there is illness, injury, or another *documented* excuse. If a student misses an exam due to illness, injury, something out of their control they must 1. Provide documentation (doctor's note, police report, etc), 2. Notify Dr. Schoen as soon as possible of intent to take a make-up exam, and 3. Prepare to take the make-up exam within 1 week of the excused absence. Students who miss an exam with no excused absence will receive a zero for that exam. If the student foresees that s/he will be unable to complete the course, then s/he should drop the course or accept the posted grade.

Plagiarism policy

Plagiarism on any assignment (discussion boards, quizzes, journals, etc) will not be tolerated. Students are responsible for understanding what constitutes plagiarism. If you are confused, please ask me.

If an assignment is found to be plagiarized, the student will receive a zero for that assignment and a referral to Student Affairs.
