COURSE INFORMATION

Course Overview and description

This class delves into the history of America since 1492. The Colonial period in American history lasted over 250 years (1492-1765) and is a complex story that is often neglected in American History. Through lecture, discussions, readings, and multimedia, this course will explore themes in American history. This course will strengthen your critical thinking, reading, and writing skills, and provide a foundation for understanding the modern world. You will demonstrate the ability to develop and focus on one topic in writing assignments and present ideas in an organized, logical, and coherent form. You will also demonstrate the ability to use Standard English grammar, punctuation, spelling, and usage. Lastly, you will hopefully leave this class with a better understanding of America's past and how it has shaped the present.

- To understand historical debates.
- To work with primary documents and develop an understanding of how historians use documents to interpret the past.
- To critically analyze a historical text.
- To write clear and coherent essays that develop a historical argument.

Book Reviews

There will be two critical reviews of monographs. Each review will be 900-1100 words long and be modeled after critical reviews in academic journals such as the *American Historical Review* or *The William and Mary Quarterly*. A book review concentrates on identifying and critiquing on the author's thesis. What is the author trying to argue, what evidence do they use, and do you agree and disagree? It is not just a simple summary of the book. This assignment will be worth 10% of the total grade per book review.

Biography Research Paper Project

You will perform primary and secondary historical research on one individual who lived in Colonial America (1580-1763) and write a biographic paper (10 pages of text) with appropriate footnotes and bibliography. The topic choice is the student's decision (within the class's subject area), but it must be reached in consultation with the instructor. Students should get to the library early (virtually) and begin searching out primary documents they can base their research. We have digital databases!

Please let the instructor know your person of interest by the Week 3 due date (see course calendar) This assignment will be worth 2.5% of the total grade.

The student then will write a short proposal for their research paper. This would be similar to a conference proposal no more than 300 words long by the Week 5 due date (see course calendar) This assignment will be worth 7.5% of the total grade.

The annotated bibliography will consist of at least 8 monographs and 3 journal articles. This assignment will be worth 15% of the total grade.

The final essay will be ten pages of content text (not including bibliography pages) This assignment will be worth 20% of the total grade.

There will be period research checks throughout the semester (orally or written).

Digital Oral Presentation of Biography Topic

Students will give a 5-8 minute presentation on their research topic in class via studio worth 10% of the final grade. Each student will make a PowerPoint presentation via Studio and post it in Canvas for the class to see it.

Midterm and Final Exams

The final exam will contain short answer and essay questions. To prepare for the exam, please take thorough notes while reading your American Colonies textbook, and any other assigned course materials throughout the course, and while watching the mini-lectures throughout the course. These assignments will be worth 10% (midterm) and 15% (final) of the total grade. Some portions of the final will be comprehensive.

Grading Criteria Rubric and Conversion
