COURSE INFORMATION: This course will examine the role of the military throughout American history from 1607 to the present, with an emphasis on the United States Army. It will highlight the evolution of strategy, operations, tactics, and organization. The course examines the development and implementation of national military policy, the characteristics and behavior of the armed forces, and civilian-military relations within the American social, cultural, political, economic, and technological context.

The course focuses on the American Revolution, War of 1812, Mexican War, U.S. Civil War, the Indian Wars, the Philippine-American War, World War I, World War II, Korean War, Cold War, Vietnam War, Persian Gulf War, and the Global War on Terror. We will use a lens of the military operations order to analyze each conflict: Situation(intelligence), Mission (strategic level), Execution (Operational/tactical level), Administrative and logistics.

Themes: The process by which US military policy changed over time and the ways has it remained constant. How have the US armed forces evolved and adapted in peace and war? How has the American public's and the armed forces' interpretation of the 'lessons of history' shaped military policy? How have Americans viewed their armed forces in popular culture and memory?

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Examine and discuss the origins, historical development, and functions of American military institutions and military policies.

- 2. Examine and discuss the origins, operations, and outcome of American conflicts.
- 3. Examine, discuss, and assess the symbiotic relationship between war, the military, and American society.
- 4. Enhance students' ability to ask questions of, evaluate, and effectively synthesize primary and secondary historical writings.
- 5. Develop the ability to effectively express ideas in written and oral form.
- 6. Expand knowledge of the historical and social contexts to better analyze present conditions.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Quizzes: Five online quizzes will be open on Saturday from 8am-midnight. Contact instructor prior to quiz regarding work conflicts. Each will focus on the reading for the preceding week(s).

Film Review: All students are responsible for viewing <u>all films</u>. Students must pick two of the films and write a 600-word min. essay on each that analyzes historical accuracy, military lessons to be learned, and usefulness in understanding timeless problems of warfare (leadership, logistics, intelligence, cultural literacy...). Papers are due prior to the film's discussion.

Paper/presentation: Students may choose a short research paper, historiographic essay, or biography of a significant American military figure, and write a 5–7-page paper. Students must submit their topic choices in writing by 28 February and are subject to the instructor's approval so as to avoid duplicate topics. Details for each on Canvas.

For <u>research paper</u>, pick a topic with instructor approval that uses the textbook, class readings/lectures, and at least four primary and/or secondary sources.

For <u>historiographic essay</u>, select one American war, or one aspect of American military operations (i.e. logistics, intelligence, propaganda, doctrine...), with instructor approval. Your sources will be the textbook and class readings/lectures and at least five journal articles or books on that subject, published over a span of at least forty years. Weave them together to show the various interpretations of that topic over time. This is the preferred option for History majors.

<u>Biography</u>, like the research paper but focused on a military leader. Essentially this option is a book review of a biography, expanded by additional research as above.

Exams: Consist of multiple choice/short answer/essay questions covering the period up to the test. Study guide will be provided two weeks prior.

Grades will be posted to the Canvas site. I will endeavor to grade all assignments within one week, papers may take two, due to the reading involved.

Grading Policies: Late work will incur a 10% per week penalty. Under no circumstances will work be accepted after the last day of class without prior approval from me.
