Sel. Topics: US Foreign Policy

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Course Description

Explore various ideological schools of thought in the study of history. Emphasis on recent trends and techniques in historical writing. Prerequisite(s): HIST 5300 and full admission to the graduate program or permission of instructor.

Overall Course Objective

After successfully completing the course, students will be able to appraise the various historiographical approaches through time. Students will be able to develop a research paper examining the historiographical approach to a specific topic.

Specific Course Objectives

After successfully completing the course, students will be able to

- 1. Examine the development of historiography
- 2. Evaluate the growth of various schools of historiographical study
- 3. Analyze the latest developments in historiographical schools and historical methods
- 4. Construct a historiographical research paper on a specific topic
- 5. Develop historical writing skills.

Course Requirements

There will be two essay exams, a midterm and a final. Grades are based upon the demonstrated depth and breadth of understanding of those topics.

The writing assignment is a 20-30 page graduate-level historiography paper on an approved topic. Paper topics, if possible, should choose a topic that could be developed in a thesis or other major research project. You should include as many books and journal articles as possible directly related to your topic. Your paper will analyze these specific works as you would with any literature review but further emphasize the contributions to what we know about the topic and relationship to any historical schools of thought.

Papers should be double-spaced, Times New Roman, 12 pnt type with one inch margins, left justified. You may use either endnotes or footnotes following Turabian (Chicago). Also include a bibliography. Your paper should have a cover page (see Turabian for examples). As with all graduate writing, style and grammar are extremely important and should conform to the guidelines in Strunk and White. Citation can be either endnotes or footnotes but should follow Chicago Style (Turabian). It is assumed you already have copies of both of these important guides.

Students will present their papers in the last class period. This is good practice for defending a thesis. You do not need slides. You should articulate your thesis statement, briefly describe the topic and the most influential works on the topic. You should be able to field questions about the historiography of the topic and about what you have learned as a historian in the process of your writing.

Participation in class should demonstrate your familiarity of the assigned readings.

Research guides for each subject taught at A&M-Central Texas are available through our website to help students navigate these resources. On campus, the library offers technology including cameras, laptops, microphones, webcams, and digital sound recorders.

Research assistance from a librarian is also available 24 hours a day through our online chat service, and at the reference desk when the library is open.
