Competency Goals Statements (certification or standards)

This course will be an introduction to abnormal psychology. There is a great deal of information to be learned, yet the deeper learning takes place in graduate programs.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Weekly Participation (20 points/week, 16 weeks, 320 points total): Each week is represented by a module in this course. Each module will include one prompt for participation. Prompts may include commenting on a discussion post, listening to an assigned podcast or reading an assigned reading or website. Students can receive 15 points for an original post and 5 points for commenting on a peer's post. Both the resource and the discussion post prompt are available on the course calendar and the module. On the weeks when a class meeting is held, participation will include attending class. Discussion board posts should be turned in by the Wednesday of each week by 11:59 PM or late points will be assessed.

Case Studies (30 points/case study, 6 case studies, 180 points total): Reading six individual case studies of your choosing from the Casebook (found in the required readings section) and answering the discussion questions at the end of each case study. This assignment is to be 1-2 pages in length for each case study and will allow room for the students to add their personal experiences. This assignment enhances knowledge of the various disorders discussed.

Final Project (Powerpoint) (100 points): The purpose of this assignment is to familiarize students with the research surrounding their selected topic and to give them the opportunity to present their findings. Each student will choose a relevant mental health disorder (from the text) and will be required to gather appropriate information concerning the disorder. The project is to have a minimum of 5 peer-reviewed journal articles; written in APA format or 4 peer-reviewed journal articles and 1 podcast interview with an expert in the field. Other resources may be used as well. The length of the powerpoint is 10-12 slides, including a title slide and reference slide. This project should include an insightful overview of the history/etiology, symptoms, and diagnosis and treatment. Additionally, each project must include one slide looking in depth at a recent (within the past 2 years) research study about this disorder and summarize the findings and indications of the study.

Test 1 (100 points) This short answer test will cover chapters 1, 2, 3, & 4 of the course textbook. Test 2 (100 points) This short answer test will cover chapters 5, 6, & 7, 8 of the course textbook. Test 3 (100 points) This short answer test will cover chapters 9, 10, & 11 of the course textbook. Test 4 (100 points) This short answer test will cover Chapters 12, 13, & 14 of the course textbook.

Research guides for each subject taught at A&M-Central Texas are available through our website to help students navigate these resources. On campus, the library offers technology including cameras, laptops, microphones, webcams, and digital sound recorders.
