COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Assignments: During the semester, you will get different assignments that measure your understanding to the material and help you gain programming skills. You are expected to provide thoughtful posts as a response to the discussion questions, and provide a minimum of two responses to the posts shared by other students. Failure to provide thoughtful comments/responses will result in losing points. It is your responsibility to do good research by reviewing articles and other materials to support your argument. You must cite all the resources you use. The discussions will count towards 15 points (15%) of your grade.

Project: There will be a final project that is worth 30 points (30%). The details will be provided later in the class.

Exams: There will be one final exam that is worth 30 points (30%). Details about the exam will be provided to you later in the class
