

# Sociology of Animals

## **Course Description:**

As our knowledge of the world grows, it is becoming increasingly difficult to think of non-human animals as "things" rather than "beings." It is also becoming clear that our own civilizations and cultures are intertwined with other species. This is raising questions about the ways we interact with non-human animals. How do we delineate among the creatures we love, the ones we eat, and the ones we use for work? This course is not intended to foster a particular position, but to help students explore our complicated history, present, and future with non-human animals. To that end, we will take up issues of domestication, obligation, and conservation.

## **Course objectives:**

- Students will be able to apply a sociological perspective when thinking about humananimal relationships both individually and globally.
- Students will understand the role of non-human animals in human civilization.
- Students will be able to articulate various positions in the discourse on human obligations and animal rights.
- Students will be able to defend their own stance on human obligations to domesticated, habituated, and wild animals.

## Mode of instruction and course access:

This course is 100% online and uses the A&M-Central Texas **CANVAS** Learning Management System [https://tamuct.instructure.com]. CANVAS is where you will find 100% of the information related to this course, including readings, discussions, quizzes, and projects. Monitor CANVAS for announcements every day, not just on the days things are due/assigned, since due dates occasionally may change.

The best way to contact me is through email (candace.korasick@tamuct.edu). I check email every day during the week and sometimes on the weekends as well. I do not respond to email after 6 PM but I start checking it by 6 AM the next morning. If you email in the middle of the night, please look for my response the following day. You are not disturbing me, and the more I know about a developing situation, the better I will be able to assist you when I do start working.

## **Course requirements:**

Below is a description of the four main activities for this online course. They include (1) reading assignments & short lectures, (2) discussion board participation, (3) online exams, and (4) one final project.

Please note that I use weighted grading rather than a set number of points. You will notice that two-thirds of your grade is based on discussion board participation and exams, which means it is imperative that you keep up with readings and those assignments. Students who ignore the weekly assignments and attempt to "catch up" later in the semester have a very difficult time passing a course.

- Reading assignments and other materials: Readings for the course are listed in the
  schedule below. Students should complete the weekly readings <u>before</u> attempting to
  complete any assignment, including discussion boards. Readings are available online in
  the course E-Reserves folder or as links to outside sources. E-Reserve readings are marked
  on the course schedule as "eRes" readings.
- **Discussion boards:** Students will participate in six discussion boards evenly spaced throughout the semester. *The first one is due at the end of Week 1 and does not require you to complete any readings beforehand.* (In fact, I'd prefer it if you did not.)

The remaining five discussion boards will require three components: a question to your classmates inspired by the course materials at hand, a 350-500 word answer to each of two classmates' questions.

Your question(s) to your classmates should be made by **the end of the day (11:59 PM CST) each Thursday**. Once several initial posts have been made, you will move on by reading and responding to <u>at least two</u> of your peers' primary posts. Response posts commenting and reflecting upon the comments of your peers should be made by **the end of the day (11:59 PM CST) each Sunday.** These responses must utilize course materials from the periods indicated in answering your classmates' questions. The best will demonstrate depth of understanding, pulling together your own thoughts and positions with those from the materials. All students are advised to include an incongruous sentence about waffles in one of the posts due February 12.

A more detailed rubric is in Canvas.

Everyone gets one "mulligan" per component. During the course of the semester, each student may type "mulligan" as their question once and only once to be excused from asking a question that week. Likewise, they may type "mulligan" in answer to another student's question two times during the course of the semester. You will receive full credit for the question and 10/11 points for each of the answers. Use them wisely. You may use

them all for one discussion board. (Life is like that sometimes.) **All mulligans must be submitted before the post is due!** 

- Exams: Students will take 3 exams at regular intervals throughout the course and will cover the readings and other material assigned for periods indicated. The first exam is worth 25 points and is scheduled after Week 3. The remaining two exams are worth 50 points each and are scheduled for weeks 9 & 15. All exams are open-note, open-book, so no proctoring software will be utilized. The format will be a combination of multiple choice, matching, and short essay questions. You will only be able to open and take the exam one time. If you have technical problems during the exam please email me immediately so I can try to resolve the problem. Exams will be available from Wednesday afternoon until Sunday at 11:59 PM CST.
- **Final Project:** The final project will require you to analyze an animal-oriented event, organization, occupation, or popular media instance (movie, magazine, documentary, etc.) and create a digital presentation based on your research/analysis. There will be several small-point "check-ins" along the way to your final presentation, which is due **at the end of the day (11:59 PM CST) Thursday, May 11.**
- Extra Credit: There are an undisclosed number "Easter eggs" in this syllabus. Completion of each of them will add 0.25% to your final grade. Some of them require an action on a specific date, so pay attention. A few more may be added to Canvas as the semester progresses, so check the course site regularly. (These will be added to newly available pages & instructions.)

## **Posting of Grades:**

- All student grades will be posted using the Canvas grade book and students should monitor their grade status through this tool.
- Students should always refer to the syllabus for weights. The Canvas gradebook tool may misinform students from time to time. In fact, if you try to calculate your grade using points instead of weighting, you will be sorely disappointed. Email Dr. Korasick a picture of an otter no later than January 29 if you have read this statement.
- Grades will be posted within 14 days of due dates. Some assignments could require more time to read through and give individualized feedback. For such assessments, you may need to be patient.

## Make-up and late policies

This is a 100% online course. You are responsible for managing your time to make sure you complete all assignments on time. \*\*There are no make-ups for discussion posts or exams.\*\*

As noted above, all components of discussion board posts receive some credit merely for being posted on time. Students will want to choose wisely in using their discussion board mulligans. You will not be granted more if you use yours early in the semester and then encounter a situation that prevents you from completing a subsequent post.

A student may only make up an exam if there is illness, injury, or another *documented* excuse.
