Participation and Attendance

In an asynchronous online class, you have flexibility as to when you choose to login to the class each week, but **you will be expected to log on <u>at least</u> once per week**, and generally will need to log on multiple times per week. This will keep you on track working your way through the course material, and ensures that you remain engaged in the course.

How to succeed in this class

Remember that in three credit a face to face class in the long semester, you'd spend approximately 3 hours per week in class, plus another 3 hours per week on reading, assignments, or prep work (so a total of 6 hours per week in the long semester). The same amount of time is expected in an online course. Because this class takes place over 8 weeks instead of 16, that means that you should plan to spend at least 12 hours per week on this course. In order to succeed in this online format you need to be sure to do several things. (1) Stay on top of the material. Do the readings and watch the lectures early so you have plenty of time to make sure you understand. (2) Do the assignments! These are there to help you and are a significant part of your grade. They are your opportunity to engage with the material as we would during class time in a face to face class. (3) Ask questions (and read the answers)! In addition to emailing me, there is a question forum designed to help you feel comfortable asking questions and to help you learn from others' questions. Check this often to help with challenges.

If you are experiencing trouble in the course: Contact me immediately! If you are struggling with the early assignments or tests, please take the initiative to talk to me about how to make things better. Do not be embarrassed – I am here to help you.

COURSE INFORMATION Course Overview and Description

The essence of the course entails psychology of sexual behavior as related to social conduct. This course explores the field's diversity, controversy, and newest research—helping students to evaluate and understand their own unique experiences in sexuality. Topics are presented in a manner that is accurate, accessible, balanced, and nonjudgmental. This course thoroughly explores the historical, biological, psychosocial, behavioral, and cultural aspects of human sexuality.

Student Learning Outcomes

This course is designed to broaden understanding of human sexuality from a psychological, psychosocial, behavioral, and cultural perspective.

By the end of the course you will:

- 1. Have a basic understanding of the biological basis of human sexuality.
- 2. Be able to compare and contrast variations in human sexual behavior and sexuality.
- 3. Understand current social issues related to human sexuality.
- 4. Use your knowledge to promote sexual health for a wider audience.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Assignments and Evaluations

(a) **Syllabus Quiz (20 points):** In order to ensure that you have read the syllabus and really understand the course policies and what is expected of you, the first thing you will need to do in

the course is a mandatory syllabus quiz. You are expected to read and use the syllabus to answer the questions on the quiz. You must score 100% on this in order to stay in the course (although you can take it as many times as you need to).

(b) **Discussion forum assignments (11 forums x 30 points each = 330 points)**: For each topic, you will have a series of discussion forum posts and responses. These posts will provide evidence that you understand and have thought critically about the material. Most forum posts are written posts and should be at least 6-8 sentences. However, a few forums (labeled VIDEO FORUM) will require that you record and post a video response instead. Video forum responses should be approximately 3-5 minutes. They MUST have a recorded audio response to the questions listed and some kind of visual component. This can just be your audio and video with no extra graphics, or your audio and video along with graphics/slides/animations, or your audio and graphics/slides/animations (no video of your face). This must be something that YOU create for this assignment (it cannot be a video from Youtube, TikTok, or other sources made by someone else). It doesn't need to be over-rehearsed or well-produced, but I will be looking for genuine and thorough responses to the question. You will receive a 30% deduction on any forum if your initial response is not the correct format.

Many of the prompts will have multiple questions to include in your responses. You must answer all of the questions completely in order to get full credit. In addition, you must substantively respond to at least two others' posts in a timely manner and engage in in-depth, multi-post discussions. For video forums, replies to peers can via video or typed post. You can earn up to 20 points for each initial post, and another 5 points for each response (up to 10 points). Posts will be graded on the rubric below (and it is also posted with each assignment).

Your initial posts will be due on Thursday at 11:59 pm. This ensures that others will have time to read and respond to your posts. Unless otherwise noted, responses are due on Sunday at 11:59 pm. Late work will not be accepted.

(c) **Tests (5 tests x 80 points each = 400 points)**: There will be five essay tests which will assess content knowledge and comprehension of the material, your ability to apply the concepts that you have learned to novel problems, and analytic and critical thinking skills about the theories

and research that we have discussed. Unless otherwise noted, tests will be due on Sunday at 11:59 pm. Tests will cover reading and any additional materials on Canvas and you will have approximately 45 minutes per question. DO NOT put the essay off until the last minute. I recommend that you copy the question and the type the answer in your word processor, save all of your work, and then copy and paste the responses to submit it in Canvas. That way you have a backup in case something goes wrong. Be certain to click on the Submit tab at the end of the essay test when you are finished. Please note that the tests are available on Canvas from the beginning of the semester, therefore there are no excuses for missing a test.

(d) **Final project (250 points)**: For your final project, you will create an infographic to promote some aspect of sexual health. You will choose the topic, target audience, and purpose and find information that will help inform and make recommendations to improve sexual health. Then you will use the free Canva program to create a visually appealing way to share this information with the public. You will also record a narration of your infographic to share with the class. Parts of the project will be due throughout the course. See Canvas for more information.

Likewise, no credit will be awarded for quoted or plagiarized material on any assignment. **Quoting or paraphrasing that closely mirrors the source (textbook or other reference material) will receive no credit even if properly cited.** Students must write original sentences conveying the information they have learned to the reader (i.e., paraphrasing) and properly cite the source of the information to receive credit for writing.

All assignments should be written in proper APA style. Students must follow the APA style guidelines provided in the Publication Manual and use online style resources provided by the American Psychological Association at <u>www.apastyle.org.</u>

We offer over 350 electronic databases containing approximately 631,525 eBooks and 75,149 journals, in addition to the 97,443 items in our print collection, which can be mailed to students who live more than 50 miles from campus. Research guides for each subject taught at A&M-Central Texas are available through our website to help students navigate these resources. On campus, the library offers technology including cameras, laptops, microphones, webcams, and digital sound recorders.

Research assistance from a librarian is also available 24 hours a day through our online chat service, and at the reference desk when the library is open. Research sessions can be scheduled for more comprehensive assistance, and may take place virtually through WebEx, Microsoft Teams or in-person at the library. <u>Schedule an appointment here</u>

Our 27,000-square-foot facility on the A&M-Central Texas main campus includes student lounges, private study rooms, group workspaces, computer labs, family areas suitable for all ages, and many other features. Services such as interlibrary loan, TexShare, binding, and laminating are available. The library frequently offers workshops, tours, readings, and other events. University Writing Center

University Writing Center: For the summer semesters, all University Writing Center (UWC) tutoring services are entirely online. The hours of operation are from 10:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday with additional hours Monday through Thursday nights from 6:00-9:00 p.m. The UWC is also offering hours from 12:00-3:00 p.m. on Saturdays.

Tutors are prepared to help writers of all levels and abilities at any stage of the writing process. While tutors will not write, edit, or grade papers, they will assist students in developing more effective composing practices. By providing a practice audience for students' ideas and writing, our tutors highlight the ways in which they read and interpret students' texts, offering guidance and support throughout the various stages of the writing process. In addition, students may work independently in the UWC by checking out a laptop that runs the Microsoft Office suite and connects to WIFI, or by consulting our resources on writing, including all of the relevant style guides. Whether you need help brainstorming ideas, organizing an essay, proofreading, understanding proper citation practices, or just want a quiet place to work, the UWC is here to help!
